### Message from the Director



I'm looking forward to seeing you all at the <u>Winter Conference</u> on February 12-14, 2020 in Santa Fe. We're excited to have internationally acclaimed urbanist, futurist, and downtown innovator <u>Roger Brooks</u> as our keynote speaker.

Here is an update on two important **Legislative priorities** for NMMS and our local MainStreet communities:

#### FY21 NMMS Public Infrastructure Capital Outlay Request

- EDD Requested a \$10 million allocation for planning, design, engineering, and construction of projects in MainStreet Communities.
  - Currently, there is \$2.5 million in the Capital Outlay budget for NMMS.
- This is an improvement compared to prior years when the average allocation was \$500,000, but still short of the \$4 million we received for FY20.
- There are many Great Blocks and other priority infrastructure projects in the pipeline that need funding. Contact your Legislators and let them know how important capital outlay funding is for revitalization efforts in your community!

**HB145, MainStreet Fire Suppression Equipment Tax Credit & Fund** (sponsored by Representative Javier Martínez)

- House Bill 145 does three things: 1) Creates the Main Street Fire Suppression Equipment Tax Credit; 2) Creates the Main Street Fire Suppression Equipment Tax Credit Fund; and 3) Allocates a one-time, non-reverting \$1 million distribution to the Main Street Fire Suppression Equipment Tax Credit Fund.
- The bill will allow rural businesses located in designated New Mexico MainStreet and state authorized Arts & Cultural Districts to apply for and receive a tax credit of 50% of their total costs for the purchase and installation of qualified fire suppression equipment. The tax credit is capped at \$50 thousand per business and can be applied toward a company's modified combined tax liability (withholding taxes, compensating tax, GRT, etc. except the local portion) for the taxable period when the installation of the equipment was completed. Any unused credit can be carried forward up to five consecutive years.
- Since the focus is helping rural communities with the most need, there are additional requirements that the MainStreet/ACD district be located in a Class B County and Metropolitan Redevelopment Area.
- The bill was presented at the House Commerce and Economic Development Committee on January 27 and received a due pass.
- New Mexico IDEA, New Mexico Federation of Labor (on behalf of Firefighters), and the American Institute of Architects spoke in support of the bill.

# Roswell's "MainStreet Has a Heart" Theme



The theme for MainStreet Roswell's First Friday Downtown Market in February is "MainStreet Has a Heart." The Downtown Market is held the first Friday of every month, and downtown merchants choose a different theme each month. This is the fourth year that February's theme supports local charities.

Businesses collect donations, and/or offer percentages of sales for their selected charity.

Businesses collect donations for the first two weeks of February, starting on First Friday. MainStreet Roswell holds a "Presentation Day" event where businesses meet at Reischman park for a group photo, and present their charity organization the donations.

The 2020 MainStreet "Has a Heart!" First Friday event will be on February 7, 2020 and the "Presentation Day" will be held mid-February. These events attract local shoppers to downtown and promote merchant's support of the Roswell community.

# Opportunities

Grants from National Trust Preservation Funds - February 1, June 1, and October 1 deadline

Grants are intended to encourage preservation at the local level by providing seed money for preservation projects. These grants help stimulate public discussion, enable local groups to gain the technical expertise needed for particular projects, introduce the public to preservation concepts and techniques, and encourage financial participation by the private sector.

#### Southwest Intervention Fund - February 1, June 1 and October 1 deadline

Strategic opportunities to save sites or jump-start preservation projects, legal resources, protection of archaeological sites, communications expertise.

#### Johanna Favrot Fund - 3/1/20 deadline

Grants from the Johanna Favrot Fund for Historic Preservation generally range from \$2,500 to \$15,000.

#### Cynthia Woods Mitchell Fund for Historic Interiors - 3/1/20 deadline

Grants from the Cynthia Woods Mitchell Fund for Historic Interiors generally range from \$2,500 to \$15,000.

#### Rural Business Development Grants in New Mexico - 3/1/20 Deadline

This program is designed to provide technical assistance and training for small rural businesses. Small means that the business has fewer than 50 new workers and less than \$1 million in gross revenue.

#### FY 2020 Tribal Heritage Grant Program - 3/11/20 Deadline

Grants will fund a broad range of planning, development, and research projects for cultural resources including: survey, inventory, oral histories, interpretation, education, architectural services, historic structure reports, preservation plans, and bricks and mortar repair.

#### The Future of Shopping Small Grant Program - 3/31/20 Deadline

American Express<sup>®</sup> is teaming up with Main Street America to give 10 small business owners \$10,000 each to help their businesses innovate in this evolving retail landscape.

#### NEA Challenge America, FY2021 - 4/9/20 Deadline

Offers support to small and mid-sized organizations for projects that extend the reach of the arts to underserved populations – those whose opportunities to experience the arts are limited by geography, ethnicity, economics, or disability.

#### National Fund for Sacred Places - 4/22/20 deadline

Funding to assist in the preservation, restoration, and interpretation of historic interiors.

#### Hart Family Fund for Small Towns - 5/1/20 deadline

Grants from the Hart Family Fund for Small Towns are intended to encourage preservation at the local level by providing seed money for preservation projects in small towns.

#### Community Economic Development Projects - 5/26/20 Deadline

The Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Office of Community Services (OCS) will award approximately \$13.6 million in Community Economic Development (CED) discretionary grant funds to Community Development Corporations (CDC) for well-planned, financially viable, and innovative projects to enhance job creation and business development for individuals with low-income.
